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


Breathe, 2020, Oil on canvas, 18 x 24 inches, \$2200

Caught in the deep end of the subject's mental and emotional state, the painting invites the viewer to draw deeper and deeper in with him, almost to the point of surrender.




Through the looking-glass, 2023, Charcoal on paper, A3, \$550
